## What Is a Tragedy?

A *tragedy* is a very, very, very sad and terrible event. I may first learn about a tragedy when I watch television. This is because tragedies almost always happen someplace else.



Tragedies have *survivors*. Survivors are people who are alive after a tragedy. They have lost something very important to them, like their home.
